I) during the season and rebounded 7.6 per game; rejected NBC hardship opportunity after the season to say he'll be back again for Ray Meyer next season at DePaul; bullish power forward who still has some of the smoothest moves in the nation; came out of Westinghouse High to lead Demons to national runner-up spot as frosh, scoring 24.0 ppg. as a rookie and setting school records for scoring in the process; scored 41 points vs. Loyola and 40 against Illinois State this season; grabbed 17 rebounds against Northern Illinois; played in USOC National Sports Festival in 1978 and then played starring role on USA team that won the silver medal at the 3rd Intercontinental Cup in Argentina in the summer of '79, leading team in scoring.

ROLANDO BLACKMAN, G-F, KANSAS
STATE '81, 6-6, 190, AGE 21

Junior, Brooklyn, New York; led Wildcats to an NCAA Tourney berth, 22-9 overall mark; named the Big Eight Player of the Year in both wire service polls after the season; Big Eight post-season tourney MVP as he led 'Cats to upset win over regular-season champions Missouri at Kansas City; has a nifty .512 career field goal percentage; voted Big Eight Defensive Player of the Year for the second straight season; had a season high of 29 pts. vs. Oklahoma and topped KSU scoring in 24 games; bounced back this season after knee surgery following '78-'79 season that caused him to miss Pan American Games Trials last spring; scored 19 pts. as KSU lost by only 71-69 to NCAA Champion Louisville in Regional finals; All-Big Eight selection for two years; star at Brooklyn's William E. Grad High School, where he scored 26.5 ppg. as a senior; Business major at Kansas State.

SAM BOWIE, C, KENTUCKY '83
7-1, 219, AGE 19

Freshman, Lebanon, Pennsylvania; the first seven-footer at Kentucky under Joe Hall; Bowie broke the into the starting line-up in his rookie year and was the team's second-leading scorer at 12.9 ppg. and leading rebounder at 8.1 for the 29-6 Wildcats; topped the Cats in field goal percentage at .531; only frosh named to All-SEC first team at season's end; SEC Freshman of the Year; led team in scoring in nine games and in rebounding in 21 games; season high scoring effort was 27 vs. Ole Miss; best rebound effort was 17 against Duke in season opener at Hall of Fame Game; graceful, agile big man with exciting future; probably the top high school player in the nation one year ago at Lebanon High, where he set a basketful of records, made every High School All-America team and was inducted into the High School Division of the Basketball Hall of Fame; scored 2,226 career points and his team was 74-15 in three years; as a high school senior, he scored 28.7 and averaged 18.1 rebounds and led Lebanon to a 30-3 record; his 6-10 father, Ben, is a former player with the Harlem Magicians.

MICHAEL BROOKS, F, LASALLE '80
6-7, 221, AGE 21

Senior, Philadelphia, Penn.; Three-time All-America selection and named in one poll as the College Player of the Year in 1980; ended his career as the seventh-leading scorer in college basketball history with 2,628 pts., scoring at 24.1 last year and rebounding at 11.5 for LaSalle in a 22-9 season. Second-leading scorer on gold medal-winning USA Pan American Games team last summer, and his 27 pts. and 13 rebounds paved the way in 113-94 title game win over host Puerto Rico at Roberto Clemente Coliseum in San Juan; scored 51 points

Senior, Beloit, Wisconsin; a two-year starter and four-year letterman at Notre Dame who scored 644 career pts. for the Irish and was a steady back-court leader for four seasons; often assigned to the toughest defensive chore against Irish opponents; led team in steals each of the last two seasons; scored 7.5 ppg. last year after missing first six games with a finger injury that required late-November surgery; scored season-high of 19 pts. vs. Kentucky; participated in '79 Pan American Games tryouts and played on '79 Intercontinental Cup team that won silver medal, losing only to Soviet Union; also played on April '79 USA team that toured the People's Republic of China, courtesy of ABAUSA; prepped at Beloit High, where he scored over 20 ppg. as a senior.

Men's Events

The USA swept the river on Saturday except for the single sculls and quadruple sculls. Hazeltine placed 2nd in the lightweight single sculls. On Sunday the "8" set a course record by 02:57 secs. The same men's crews won on Sunday.

Women's Events

The ladies won five gold and Joan Lind was beaten by New Zealand in the single sculls. On the following day Ms. Lind avenged the defeat of the previous day, the double sculls placed first while the pairs without coxswain finished 2nd and the quadruple sculls with coxswain came in 4th.

RECAPITULATION

The USA flotilla enjoyed great success in the three international regattas. The Men's eight climaxed their successes with a victory in the Grand Challenge at Henley and the women's "8" scored a first for USA rowing by defeating the East German "8" on Sunday at Lucerne. Joan Lind remains as one of the great scullers in the world.

BIOGRAPHICAL SKETCHES OF MANAGERS AND COACHES

ARCHERY

HAROLD R. KREMER, manager. He has been active in the National Archery Association, has officiated at archery tournaments for many years and has been a member of the Pheasantdale Archery Team. He now resides in Atlanta and is associated with Custom Design Homes, Inc. A native of Philadelphia, Kremer was captain of his high school and college swimming teams and at Temple University was the Eastern Collegiate Diving champion.

DWIGHT A. NYQUIST, coach. A member of the NAA Board of Directors for eight years, he is also active on several important NAA committees. For the last ten years he has been coach of archery at Shoreline College, Seattle, after having coached the basketball team for five years. In 1977, Nyquist was coach of the USA team in the World Championships in Australia. He has been coaching in secondary schools and colleges since his graduation from Wheaton College in 1956. At Wheaton, he earned all-conference honors in his senior year when he captained the football team.

BASKETBALL, WOMEN'S

LEA FOLLIS PLARSKI, manager. She serves as vice president for women of the National Junior College Athletic Association. Lea is also a member of the Advisory Committee of the Women's Sports Foundation, Palo Alto. In the last 17 years she has been coaching at the high school and college level. Currently, she is professor of physical education and serves as women's director at the St. Louis Community College at Florissant Valley. She received her degrees from Emporia State. In the last three years, she has been Chief of Mission for four national teams, including entries for the Pan American Games and World University Games.

SUE GUNTER, head coach. She also handled the National team participating in the Jones Cup in Taipei a year ago. One of the pioneer women's college coaches, Sue coaches at the Stephen Austin State University in Nacogdoches, Texas.

PATRICIA SUE HEAD, assistant coach. A member of the silver medal '76 USA Olympic team and the '75 gold medal Pan American team, Pat now handles the University of Tennessee. The Lady Vols finished second in the AIAW post-season tournament and placed three on the Olympic Team (Warlick, Noble and Rankin). She has received degrees from the Universities of Tennessee at Martin and Tennessee at Knoxville. At college she won awards for volleyball and basketball all four years. Currently, she is a member of the USOC Athletes' Advisory Council and the ABAUSA Women's Games Committee. She was coach of the '79 team that won the world title and the '79 Pan American team that placed second.

BASKETBALL, MEN'S

JOSEPH VANCISIN, manager. Serves as the executive director of the National Association of Basketball Coaches and resides in Branford, Connecticut. The former Dartmouth basketball captain (he also starred in baseball during WWII), was an assistant at Michigan and Minnesota before being tapped for the head coaching position at Yale. He is on the Board of Directors of the Naismith Basketball Hall of Fame. He was also manager of the '76 Olympic Team.

DAVID GAVITT, head coach. Is athletic director at Providence College. He played basketball at Dartmouth and returned to be head basketball coach for two seasons before moving to Providence where his record for ten years was 209-84. His Providence College five had an enviable record of winning 20 or more over

over eight consecutive seasons, during which span his team was tapped for the NCAA tournament five times and the NIT on three occasions. In 1973, Providence made the NCAA final four. He also serves on the Executive Committee of ABAUSA, the governing body. In '75, he coached the USA entry in the FIBA Intercontinental Cup play.

LARRY BROWN, assistant coach.

Was a stellar guard on the 1964 team. He played at North Carolina and later was a member of the Goodyear Wingfoots ('64-'65) of professional basketball, then played five seasons in the old ABA before returning to Carolina as an assistant to Dean Smith. He moved to the Carolina Cougars of the ABA as coach for two seasons before taking over the Denver Nuggets. For the 1979-80 season, he returned to college coaching at UCLA and took the Bruins to the NCAA finals (losing to Louisville), after finishing fourth in the Pac-10 regular season play.

BOXING

PATRICK NAPPI, head coach.

He is serving his second term as Olympic coach and has been the National team coach, appointed by the Boxing Committee of the AAU. The USA boxers at the '76 Olympic Games won five gold medals, one silver and one bronze. Last fall, in the inaugural World Cup Tournament in New York, the USA team won team honors. He was also head coach of the '79 Pan American team which won four gold medals. He is formerly the technical advisor to the Department of the Army for its boxing program. In '72 he was coach of the USA service team in the world military games (CISM) and the USA won team honors. Two years later, he was head coach of the USA team in the first World Championship tournament in Havana.

RICHARD PETTIGREW, assistant coach. A native of Tyler, Texas, Dick was eight-time U.S. Navy heavyweight champion between 1960 and 1968 and twice won the Interservice heavyweight title. In 1966, he won the world military games (CISM) heavyweight title after finishing runner-

up in 1962. Twice Dick was a semi-finalist in the Olympic Trials (1960 and 1964). Currently, he is the U.S. Navy boxing coach attached to the Recreational Services Office of the Atlantic Fleet. He was coach of the '71 Pan American Team, assistant coach of the '79 Pan American Team and has been tapped for coaching assignments at the USOC National Training Centers for the last three years.

EDWARD SILVERGLADE, manager.

Was born, raised, educated and is a life-time resident of Trenton, New Jersey. In 1935, Ed won the national table tennis title and participated in several international matches. He is also a former City of Trenton handball doubles champion. For many years, he has been active in the AAU boxing program at all levels. He is a past president of the Babe Ruth Baseball League and has been extremely active in local civic and religious affairs. He served as wrestling coach at both Trenton high school and Rider College. In 1966, Silverglade was honored with the Trenton P.A.L. Man of the Year Award.

CANOE AND KAYAK

HOWARD TURNER, manager.

In 1977 and 1978 was the national champion in the Masters Class. He is associated with the Dukane Corporation of St. Charles, Illinois, where he also resides. Dedicated to physical activity, for many years Turner annually has kayaked more than 1,000 miles, run more than 1,000 miles and cycled more than 1,000 miles. On the '76 Olympic team, his daughter, Ann, was a member of the kayak doubles and his son, Brent, paddled in the K-4.

ANDRAS (Andy) TORO, head coach.

Was born in Budapest and represented Hungary in the 1960 (C-2 1,000m-3rd) and the 1964 (C-1 1,000m-4th) Olympic Games. Since emigrating to the United States, Toro has degrees in Naval Architecture and Marine Engineering from the University of Michigan. He currently resides in El Cerrito and is an

independent naval architect and marine consultant. He is also a member of the USOC Executive Board and the USOC Athletes' Advisory Council. In the '72 Olympic Games, paddling for the USA, he reached the semi-finals of the C-1 and four years later was eliminated in the repechage (second chance) heats of the C-2. He has been a member of the American Canoe Association since 1965 and for the last 12 years has held a certificate from the international federation as an international judge. He has been a part of two C-2 national championship duos.

SPERRY JONES RADEMAKER, assistant coach.

Along with her sister, Marcia Jones Smoke, won numerous awards in AAU swimming before switching to kayaking after viewing the sport at the 1960 Olympic Games in Rome. She is married and has an 8-year-old son. She has participated in most of the national championships since 1962, and was a member of the '68 and '72 Olympic teams. She currently is active in kayaking, in marathon canoeing, open canoe, whitewater and flatwater canoeing. She has received degrees from the University of Michigan in both geography and cartography. Sperry now resides in Floral City, Florida.

CYCLING

EDMUND BURKE, Ph.D., a graduate of Ohio State, he is a physiologist with the Department of Internal Medicine at the University of Iowa. Manager. EDWARD BORYSEWICZ, Coach, born and educated in Poland won Polish National track and road titles before emigrating. He is the national coach for the U.S. Cycling Federation. He lives in Newark, N.J. TIMOTHY J. KELLY, Coach, won a silver medal in the '63 Pan Am Games and was '64 National 100km champion. He is a production supervisor with the Golden Technology Inc., Santa Clara. CARL LEUSENKAMP, assistant coach, is the owner-manager of the Action Sport, Bicycle/Ski shop. Member of three Olympic teams and won a silver in the '67 Pan Am Games and a coveted bronze medal in the '75 Pan Ams. He was a four-time member of the U.S.A. National team for the world championships.

DIVING

BRYAN ROBBINS, coach/manager. Earned All-America recognition three years at the Southern Methodist University, where is now the diving coach and a member of the physical education department. Born in Corpus Christi, Texas, he is now a resident of Dallas.

RON O'BRIEN, coach.

Has handled more USA teams in international competition than any other coach. He is serving for a third time as head coach of diving for the Olympic Team after being the Assistant Diving Coach in 1968. Twice he has coached the Pan American Team and twice handled the USA divers in the world championships. Currently he is diving coach for the Mission Viejo Nadadores in California. A three-time NCAA All America selection, O'Brien won the National AAU 3-m title in 1961. He lettered in diving and gymnastics three years each while attending Ohio State. After serving as diving coach at Minnesota for two years, he returned to his alma mater where he was head mentor for 15 years before moving to Mission Viejo. He also earned three degrees at Ohio State, including his doctorate in 1967.

DICK KIMBALL, coach.

Has earned many honors at the University of Michigan where he has enjoyed unusual success, including serving as mentor of Micki King, '72 Olympic champion.

EQUESTRIAN SPORTS

JONATHAN R. BURTON, manager. Also serves as executive vice president of the US Equestrian Team, Inc., a position he accepted after retiring from the U.S. Army with the rank of Major General after 33 years of active service. He was graduated from Michigan State University. In '56, Gen. Burton was a member of the Olympic Three-Day squad which competed in Stockholm (while the other events were in Milbourne). General Burton was the national three-day champ in 1947 and also the individual military champion at the National

Horse Show the same year. He is extremely active in equestrian "circles" and is chairman of the American Horse Shows Association's Combined Events Committee, a senior AHSA judge in dressage, show jumping, hunters and hunter equitation, as well as an AHSA steward and technical delegate, and an international judge in Three-Day, Show Jumping and Dressage. He was manager of the USA Pan American Teams in 1975 and 1979 and the '76 Olympic Team.

JACK LE GOFF, coach (3-day team). As coach of the three-day equestrian team, he has been with USA riders since 1970. He competed for his native France in the 1960 and 1964 Olympic Games, the 1964 French riders earning the bronze medal in the team competition. He has guided the USA three-day squad to team honors in the 1977 world championships and has helped the USA to individual gold medals in the last two world championships. At the '76 Montreal Olympic Games, the USA three-day squad won both the individual and team gold medals.

BERTALAN de NEMETHY, coach (show jumping) Has achieved remarkable success in training our national team horses and preparing our national team riders since he was appointed national coach in 1955. The current year could have been his crowning success as he celebrates his 25th anniversary. A 1932 graduate of the Hungarian Royal Military Academy, he was a member of Hungary's 1936 Olympic team. This would have been his 7th straight assignment handling the USA show jumping entries. In addition, he has handled the show jumpers five times in the Pan American Games.

MELLE ROELOF FRANZ VAN BRUGGEN, coach (dressage riders). Was born in Holland and is now regarded as a resident of Australia. He succeeded the late Bengt Helge Lungquist as coach of the dressage team. He trained at the famed Spanish Riding School in Vienna and later served as assistant trainer at the Berne School in Switzerland. He was a coach of the Swiss dressage entries at the Munich Games in '72.

ALFRED M. SIMENSEN, DVM is the team's veterinarian. He graduated from the

University of New Hampshire and earned his DVM at Cornell University's famed veterinary school.

FENCING

ANTHONY (Jack) KEANE, team captain. Resides in East Brunswick, NJ. He has had a distinguished career of leadership in the sport, both as a collegian at N.Y.U. and later as captain of the New York Athletic Club Fencers for almost 20 years. He was a '67 Pan American Games gold medalist in the individual and team sabre events. He was an active fencer as part of two each Olympic and Pan American Teams before turning to administrative leadership posts.

MARIUS P. VALSAMIS, M.D., manager. As manager for the second straight Olympic team, he has been an associate professor of pathology at the New York Medical College and Associate Attending Pathologist for the Bird S. Coler Hospital. At Columbia University, he lettered in both fencing and lightweight crew. He has been the attending physician for at least the last ten USA world teams. He made his administrative debut as manager of the '75 Pan American fencing team. He is now the head of the Medical Commission of the Amateur Fencers League of America and serves on the Medical Commission for the international fencing federation, world governing body.

YVES LEON AURIOL, coach. A native of France and graduate of the University of Toulouse in France (1958) and now is the head coach at Portland State as well as the Salle Auriol Fencing Club (one of the members is Mike Marx). Ten years ago he was mentor for the French Junior Fencing Team. Twice Auriol has been coach of the USA entries in the World University Games and in 1978 handled the fencers in the world championships.

CSABA ELTHES, coach. From New York City, he is perhaps the most distinguished USA maestro in the sport and has been a part of the fencing picture since his competitive days in Budapest where he won the 1939 world university games

title. This would have been the fifth USA Olympic Team he has coached. His high regard within the fencing family is attested to by the fact that the New York Athletic Club (site of the Olympic Committee organization meeting in 1921), Pace University and the Fencers' Club of New York all claim him as their head coach. He did earn a Doctor of Laws degree in Budapest in 1956 and for six years was the Hungarian national fencing coach. He has been coach of the USA fencers in world championships no fewer than six times between 1958 and 1978. He has been identified by AFLA as Chief of the National Fencing coaching staff.

JOSEPH A. BYRNES, armorer. This resident of Elizabeth, New Jersey and Professor of English at N.Y.U. had little competitive sports background until he identified with state fencing activities in New Jersey, rising to the post of Secretary-Treasurer of the Fencers' Club of New Jersey for the decade beginning 1960. He has been involved in the electrical aspects of fencing (scoring machinery) for more than 20 years. He also prepares the English translation for the international rules which are still written in French. He has served as armorer many times for previous Olympic, Pan American and world teams and carries out his duties with little fanfare or notoriety, toiling until the wee small hours of the morning almost daily.

FIELD HOCKEY

MRS. MARGERY JOHNSON WATSON, manager. A native of Pennsylvania, she now resides in Kimberton. She starred in field hockey, basketball and lacrosse at Swarthmore High School and Ursinus College, introducing lacrosse to her college where she is now in her 24th year as coach. She served as '75 National Hockey Team coach for the International Conference competition in Scotland.

MS. VONNIE GROS, head coach. Is one of the most respected mentors in the country. For many years, she guided the destinies of the hockey team at West Chester (Pa.) State and more recently had been handling the

women's hockey team at Princeton University. She was the head coach of the national team in the '79 international tournament at Vancouver from which the USA was selected to participate in the Olympic Games.

WILL Van BEAUMONT, assistant coach. A native of the Netherlands, van Beaumont is caught for a second time in his team's non-participation in the Olympic Games. In 1956, he was set for a second crack at the Olympic Games when his team was "pulled" in sympathy with the Hungarian government whose lands had been invaded by the USSR armies. He earned a master's degree at the University of Illinois and his doctorate in physiology at Indiana University. He is a member of the Department of Physiology of the St. Louis University School of Medicine. He was named 15 times to the National field hockey team of the Netherlands between 1951-'57 when the team was accorded 2nd place in the world rankings. He is the acknowledged originator of the first-ever Collegiate Field Hockey (weekly) Poll, 1979.

GYMNASTICS

WILLIAM MEADE, assistant coach. He is graduate of Pennsylvania State University at University Park, Pa. He has been a tower of strength in the coaching ranks and has been extremely active in the work of the U.S. Gymnastics Federation, both nationally and internationally. He was also manager of the men's team for the '75 Pan American Games. He has enjoyed great success as the men's gymnastics coach at Southern Illinois University.

FRANCIS ALLEN, head coach, is the successful mentor at the University of Nebraska which now enjoys great prestige for the success of its gymnasts in collegiate, USGF, and international circles. Three of the members of his Nebraska Cornhusker squad are in truth homegrown and are on the '80 Olympic Team, a rarity: Larry Gerard was born in Lincoln while lanky Phil Cahoy and talented James Hartung were born in Omaha! Gerard has been graduated and lives in Lincoln with his wife.

ERNESTINE WEAVER, head coach, is a former Canadian National all-around champion. She is married to the successful coach of football, Jim Weaver. She is now a professor of physical education at the University of Florida and was formerly at Clarion State in Pennsylvania. She was also coach of the successful USA gymnasts in the '79 Pan American Games in San Juan.

PAUL ZIERT, assistant coach, is head coach at the University of Oklahoma, one of the topnotch college gymnastic teams in the country. Mike Wilson of the men's team attended OU and is a protege of Ziert.

CAROL STABISEVSKI, 40, is the pianist for the women's team. He is a native of Romania and currently is the coach at the Arlington (Texas) Gymnastics Club.

JUDO

FRANK P. FULLERTON, manager. A resident of El Paso, where he is a practicing attorney. Recently, Mr. Fullerton was elected President of the Judo Division of the AAU.

MAJOR PAUL MARUYAMA, USAF, coach. Born in Tokyo, Paul has received degrees from both San Jose State and Hawaii. He's in the Phys Ed Department at the U.S. Air Force Academy. A member of the first Olympic team in judo ('64), Paul had won a silver medal in the '63 Pan American Games. Three times he has been an AAU champion and four times a college champ. Four times he was a member of the national team to the world champion-

ships and placed fourth in '75. He placed among the top three in 12 national AAU championships and has won a gold ('71), silver ('76), and bronze ('79) in the world military games (CISM). He served one term on the Athletes' Advisory Council of the USOC ('73-'76) and has been a judo consultant to the President's Council on Olympic Sports.

ROWING, MEN'S

PETER W. ZANDBERGEN, manager. Born in Philadelphia, he graduated from the University of Nebraska with a degree in anthropology and is now a bank vice president and for three years the head crew coach at the University of Nebraska. Currently, he is President of the Midwest Association of Rowing Colleges. In his senior year at Nebraska, he was honored as the "Outstanding Oarsman" among the sweepswingers.

HARRY L. PARKER, head coach. Had been a three-sport high school athlete at East Hartford high before he entered the University of Pennsylvania in the fall of 1953 and was introduced to the sport of rowing. He was a member of the Pennsylvania eight that won the '55 Grand Challenge Cup in the Henley Royal Regatta, was twice national single sculls champion, won the '59 Pan Am Games single sculls and placed fifth in the Rome Olympic Games ('60). He has just completed his 18th successful season as Harvard coach and three times he has been an Olympic men's coach. In '76 he mentored the bronze medalist USA women's eight at Montreal. Quiet-spoken, self-effacing, he just might be the most successful "sweep" coach in the long history of the sport.

MICHAEL VESPOLI, sculling coach. Won six national NAAO championships along with a gold medal in '74 world championships and the '75 Pan American Games in the eight. He has received degrees from both Georgetown and the University of Massachusetts. He previously coached at Massachusetts and Wichita State and for the last three years

been the assistant crew coach (to former Olympian Tony Johnson) at Yale, thus returning to the city of his birth.

PETER GARDNER, assistant coach, is a native of St. Louis. He has enjoyed great success as the head coach of rowing at Dartmouth College. He has been instrumental in establishing the Dartmouth rowing course as the ideal training ground for the USA "sweep" rowers.

RICHARD DREISSIGACKER, Boatman, is making his debut as a member of the administration. An engineer with Concept II, the Brown alumnus was in the 4 without at Munich and in in the '71 Pan Am Games. He rowed in the National "8" in the '70 World's. He was in two national NAAO championship "8's" and three "4's without" that won NAAO titles.

ROWING, WOMEN'S

PETER E. LIPPETT, manager.
A San Francisco attorney who was a member of the University of Calif. at Berkeley crew 1954-1958 as a coxswain. For eight years he coxed for the Lake Merritt Rowing Club of Oakland. He recently authored a best-selling book, "Estate Planning-What Anyone Who Owns ANYTHING Must Know". For the last eight years he has chaired the U.S. Olympic Women's Rowing Committee. He is a certified judge-referee for both the NAAO and Mr. Thomas Keller's International Federation of Rowing Societies.

KRIS KORZENIOWSKI, coach of the eight. Born in Poland, and served as Polish national coach 1969-'72 (including the '72 Olympic team) before emigrating to Canada where he was head women's coach of the '76 Olympic Team. Now women's coach at Princeton University, Kris handled the bronze medalist USA eight at the championships at Bled last year.

ROBERT G. ERNST II, sculling coach. Is the assistant rowing coach at the University of Washington and was a petitioner on behalf of the other athletes to have the federal courts "throw out" the decision of

the USOC House of Delegates not to participate in Moscow. He received a bachelor's degree from the University of California at Irvine. THOMAS McKIBBON, sculls coach, was on the '72 Olympic Team in the doubles with Van Blom. Coach at the successful Long Beach Rowing Ass'n his best protege is Joan Lind. He has degrees from Cal State at Long Beach and UCLA. '70 Henley Royal Regatta doubles 1st.

NATHANIEL CASE, "sweeps" coach. Born in Alabama, attended Yale University ('70) and started his coaching at Howard University upon graduation. Since 1973 he has been the women's crew coach at Yale University and he also serves as chairman of the Eastern Association of Women's Rowing Colleges as well as a member of the Olympic Women's Rowing Committee.

SHOOTING

WILLIAM C. PULLUM, manager. Born in Arkansas and educated in Arkansas and Colorado where he participated in football, baseball, track and boxing. Currently, he is the custom gun shop manager, building and accurizing all guns used by the U.S. army shooters at all levels of competition. In the period 1963-'75, he coached all USA rifle gold medal winners in Olympic Games and world championship competitions.

JOSEPH B. BERRY, assistant manager. A resident of Lorton, VA, he is associated with Office of the Chief Army Reserve, Operations and Training Division of the Department of the Army. After attending the University of Nevada where he lettered in skiing and won the Pacific Coast Intercollegiate cross country race twice, he entered the US Army. In 1957, he was Army rifle champion. He was marksmanship officer (often referred to by one women's magazine as "markspersonship" officer) for the U.S. Army. Mr. Berry was team captain for the 1974 USA National Team to the world championships and has been a manager for the last two Pan American Teams and this would have been his second shot as a manager of the Olympic

Team. Between 1973 and 1979 Mr. Berry was the Captain of the USA National Shooting Team.

JAMES B. SIZEMORE, gunsmith. Born in Columbus, Georgia, and now lives in Phoenix City, Alabama. He is attached to the U.S. Army's Marksmanship Unit at Fort Benning. He has been attached to a number of USA teams in international competitions 1977 to the present, including the 1979 Pan American Games and the 1978 World Championships in South Korea.

SWIMMING, MEN'S AND WOMEN'S

GEORGE T. BREEN, Manager
Born in Buffalo and educated at Cortland (N.Y.) State and Indiana University, Mr. Breen is swimming coach at the University of Pennsylvania. In '56 Olympic Games, Mr. Breen was a silver medalist on the 800m freestyle relay team and bronze medalist in the 400m and 1,500 m freestyle events. At the 1959 Pan American Games he won the 400m and placed second in the 1,500m freestyle events. He closed out his international career with a bronze medal in the '60 Rome Olympics in the 1,500m. During his competitive career, he set five world records. He has been selected for membership in the International Swimming Hall of Fame, Ft. Lauderdale.

GEORGE E. HAINES, head coach. Born in Huntington, Indiana, and would have had a coaching assignment for the fifth straight time for the USA forces in the Olympic Games. Currently, he is swimming coach for the Foxcatcher Frams Swim Club, Newtown Square, Pennsylvania. Previously, he had been swimming coach at both Santa Clara High School and the Santa Clara Swim Club for 24 years before accepting the coaching position at UCLA which he resigned to accept the Foxcatcher opportunity two years ago. Many consider him the most revered swimming coach in the USA and his overall record certainly stamps him as one of the most successful.

PAUL DAVID BERGEN, assistant coach. Born in Milwaukee and educated at the

University of Wisconsin, he is now head coach of swimming (women's) at the University of Texas. Since 1965 he has had ten separate coaching assignments. Before going to Texas, he was coach of the Nashville Aquatic Club where he developed fabulous Tracy Caulkins. Twice Mr. Bergen was honored by the American Swimming Coaches as "Swimming Coach of the Year". Also, twice he has been a coach for the USA National Team in world championships (1975-'78). Over the years he has contributed many thoughtful articles to the recognized aquatics' publication, Swimming World.

DONALD LEE GAMBRIL, assistant coach. Born in Kansas, educated at Woodrow Wilson high school in Los Angeles and at California State, Los Angeles. Mr. Gambril has been head coach at California State at Long Beach (4 years) and at Harvard (2 years) before accepting his current post at the University of Alabama (since 1973) where he also directs the activities of the Tuscaloosa Swim Club. His assignment to the '80 Olympic Team marks the fourth straight Olympic Team he has served. Athletically, at East Los Angeles Junior College, Mr. Gambril participated in football, swimming and water polo and was an All America Junior College swimming selection in 1954.

MARK EDWARD SCHUBERT, assistant coach. Born in Cleveland, educated at the University of Kentucky, where he was assistant coach for two years. In 1972 he took over as head swim coach of the Mission Viejo Nadadores and his teams have won 16 national AAU team titles. The swimmers for Mission Viejo have won 65 national AAU titles, broken 71 existing American records, and established 17 world marks for long course competition. His best know proteges would include double '76 Olympic gold medalist, Brian Goodell, Jesse Vassallo, Shirley Babashoff, Alice Browne and Jennifer Hooker. He was a coach for the USA National Team at the 1978 World Championships in West Berlin at which meet the USA women regained world supremacy over the German Democratic Republic swimmers.

MRS. POKEY WATSON RICHARDSON, assistant manager.

Closed out her career in a blaze of glory at the '68 Olympic Games winning a coveted gold medal in the 200m backstroke. Born in Mineola, New York, Pokey was graduated from Santa Clara High (she was among the wunder-kind swimming for George Haines) and she attended UCLA after retiring from swim competition. She is now a swim coach at the Punahou School in Honolulu, after having served as head coach of women's swimming at Southern California, 1974-1979. During four of those years, she was also the Women's Sports Information Director. In '64 she won a gold medal in the 400m freestyle relay at Tokyo at the age of 14. The next year she won the AAU 100m freestyle and set a world record in the 200m freestyle and another American record in the 100m freestyle the following year in the AAU long course championships.

MRS. LINDA HILDRETH BURTON, assistant manager.

Is the wife of Mike Burton, '68 Olympic 400m and 1,500m champion and a repeat victor in the grueling 1,500 at Munich four years later. She was former world class swimmer with Mrs. Richardson on George Haines' Santa Clara Swim Club Team. She now resides in Glendale, Arizona.

SOCCER

WALTER CHYZOWYCH, coach.

Is also the USA national coach of soccer. At Temple University, he participated in football (expert placekicker), soccer and baseball, earning NCAA All America rating three times in soccer. In professional soccer (the early "no real money" days) Walt was the leading scorer four years in the old American Soccer League. He represented the USA in 22 international matches. Before accepting the challenging post of national soccer coach, Walt had a successful run as coach at the Philadelphia College of Textiles, winning 146, losing 37 and playing to 20 ties in 12 years. He was coach of the '79 Pan American Team.

ROBERT GANSLER, assistant coach.

Was captain of the '67 Pan American soccer team at Winnipeg and he had played on the '63 Pan American team

(USA did not qualify for the '64, '68 Olympic Games). For four years, he was soccer coach at Marquette and for nine years handled the Bavarian Soccer Club in Milwaukee, 1976 U.S. Amateur Cup champions. He is also the assistant national soccer coach, employed by the U.S. Soccer Federation.

KURT LAMM, manager, is the executive director of the U.S. Soccer Federation, national governing body of the sport. His enlightened outlook has raised the level of soccer in the USA to a new all-time high. He is one of the men "behind the scenes" playing a key role in establishing soccer as a major sport in the USA. He is highly respected internationally in the sport.

TRACK AND FIELD, MEN'S

ROBERT WARREN NEWLAND, manager.

Is assistant principal at Winston Churchill High in Eugene, Oregon and has received three degrees from the University of Oregon. He started his high school coaching career at Medford, Oregon where, in a ten-year period, his team won the state title nine times and placed second once. Then he moved to North Eugene High where he was the long distance running coach for 14 years. Twenty-five years ago, he was a member of the group founding the famed Oregon T.C. He has frequently been tapped as a lecturer or clinician at national and international coaching clinics and has been meet director or assistant meet director of at least 12 important meets at Eugene since 1962. At Montreal, he was the assistant manager of the track team. Last summer, he was the manager of the USA track and field delegation to the Moscow Spartakiade.

JIMMY CARNES, head coach.

Was born in Eatonton, Georgia and graduated from Mercer University of Macon, Georgia. In 1962, he was appointed track coach at Furman and three years later moved to the University of Florida as head coach. Since 1976, Mr. Carnes has been chairman of the national track and field group and is now the founding President of the Athletics Congress of the USA (TAC), governing body for track and field. Along with

Olympian Marty Liquori, Mr. Carnes in 1972 founded the Athletic Attic, a retail sporting goods enterprise which now encompasses 130 stores with retail sales last year of 30 million dollars. He is currently on leave to devote full-time to amateur track and field. At Montreal, Mr. Carnes was an assistant coach of the Olympic team and the following year was elected for the first time as the national track and field chairman, succeeding '76 Olympic head coach, Dr. LeRoy T. Walker. Mr. Carnes heads up the State of Florida physical fitness program under the Governor.

ROY GRIAK, assistant coach. A graduate of the University of Minnesota, he is currently its track and cross country mentor. Roy had been head coach of the remarkably successful entry in the '75 Pan American Games in Mexico, was an assistant manager of the '72 Olympic Team and was manager of the national track and field teams of '73 and '77 before being head coach of the USA track and field entries for the 1979 Moscow Spartakiade.

STANLEY H. HUNTSMAN, assistant coach. Attended Wabash College and received a master's degree from Ohio University. At Ohio U., he was track coach for 15 years before moving on to the University of Tennessee to succeed Chuck Rohe in 1971. An assistant USA Olympic coach at Montreal, Mr. Huntsman has also been head coach of the '70 USA World University Games team and the '77 USA World Cup team.

JAMES M. SANTOS, assistant coach. A former standout in basketball and track at Fresno State, he is currently a full professor of physical education at California State at Hayward, where he is also head track coach. In 1972, he was AIAW Coach of the Year for Women and in 1977 earned the accolade as NCAA Division II Men's Coach of the Year. He is the only coach ever to win both a men's and women's national collegiate title. For the last four years, he has been director of vertical jumps for the Olympic track and field development committee. He has authored three books as well as numerous articles on the sport of track and field.

TOM TELLEZ, assistant track coach. Currently is the head coach at the University of Houston which produced Ollan Cassell, now Executive Director of the Athletics Congress of the USA. Born in Los Angeles, he was graduated from Fullerton Junior College and Whittier before obtaining a Master's degree from Chapman College. He coached at Fullerton J.C. for seven years, was an assistant to James Bush at UCLA for eight years, and for the last four years has been head coach at Houston.

WILLIE WILLIAMS, assistant track coach. Was a star at San Jose State in the early 60's and is now head coach at the University of Arizona. He was a member of the National team in 1963. Twice Williams has been named NCAA District VII Coach of the Year since going to Arizona 11 years ago. He earned a Master's degree in Education at Arizona in 1978.

MAJOR ERNIE CUNLIFFEE, U.S.A.F., assistant manager. Is the track coach at the Air Force Academy. He graduated from Stanford '60, earned an M.A. there in '61 an M.S. at Oregon in '66 and a doctorate from Oregon in '69. Twice honored as an NCAA All America selection for the 800m/880m ('59-'60), Major Cunliffée was a member of the national 4 x 880 m relay team that set a world record in 1960, the year in which he competed in the Rome Olympic Games in the 800m, being eliminated in the semi-finals. In '63, he placed 3rd in the Pan Am 800m and the following year was National AAU indoor 1,000m champion. He has served many times as the USA track and field coach for the CISM Games and a year ago was head women's coach for the USA National team for the Spartakiade. In the Air Force, he has been assigned as a research psychologist at the Air Force Academy ('69-'73) and at the Lackland AFB, San Antonio ('73-'78).

STEVAN MORRIS SIMMONS, assistant manager. Earned seven letters in track and

basketball at Chapman College where he earned NCAA College Division All America as a high hurdler in '65. Currently he is track coach at Gavilan College in Cal. He was an assistant coach/manager of the National Team to the Spartakiade last summer. He has coached 13 NCAA Division I or II champions in his 14 years of coaching, as well as three Olympians.

TRACK AND FIELD, WOMEN'S

DR. EVIE G. DENNIS, head manager. Is a key official of the Denver Public Schools. She was President of the Denver All-Stars T.C., 1965-'72, the Mile High Denver T.C., '72-'73, and the Denco T.C., 1974. She is second Vice President of the AAU and served as acting president of the newly-formed Athletics Congress of the USA 1978-'79, prior to the election of Jimmy Carnes as President. For the last four years, she has been the national chairman for women's track and field.

DR. KENNETH FOREMAN, head coach. Is the former professor of physical education at the Seattle Pacific College. He was a former NCAA gymnastics champion and competitor in the AAU gymnastics championships 1938-'48 inclusive. He has coached 26 NCAA track and field All America selections. Since 1955, he has also coached Sportwest T.C. of Seattle, one of his proteges being expert middle distance runner and five times world cross country champion, Doris Heritage.

DAVE LEE RODDA, assistant coach. Serves as assistant director of Recreation and Community Services at Lakewood, California. At California State at Long Beach, he was a long jumper/triple jumper. He was an assistant coach of the '75 Pan Am women's team; the National Team vs. the USSR in 1977, and coach of the USA Women's Team for the inaugural World Cup in Dusseldorf. Among his proteges have been Martha Watson, Joni Huntley, Gail Fitzgerald, Kim Attlesey, Sherry Calvert, Sandy Goldsberry and Sharron Walker.

EDWARD STANLEY TEMPLE, assistant coach. Is a legend in his own right -- coach

of 32 Olympians and 22 Olympic gold medalists as head mentor of Tennessee State for 26 years. At his alma mater, he is also an associate professor of sociology. He was head coach of the women's Olympic teams in 1960 (Wilma Rudolph won three gold medals) and 1964 (Wyomia Tyus won the first of two 100m races). Both Ms. Rudolph and Ms. Tyus attended Tennessee State and were discovered by Temple in their early high school years. He was also head coach of the USA women's teams in the '59 and '75 Pan American Games. He has been part of the Olympic women's committee ever since 1960 and has been honored with membership in the Helms Athletic Hall of Fame, the Tennessee Sports Hall of Fame, and in 1977 in the Black Hall of Fame. In 1978, the track at Tennessee State was re-named the Edward Stanley Temple Track. Of his 32 Olympians, 29 graduated from Tennessee State and three are currently enrolled. Bull's eye!

MRS. VIRGINIA H. PLIHAL, assistant manager. Since 1965, she has been an administrative volunteer with amateur sports and has served with 11 teams as a team administrator. Her daughter, at one time, was the top high jumper in the U.S.

VOLLEYBALL, WOMEN'S

MRS. RUTH BECKER, manager. At high school in Santa Monica, she starred in volleyball, basketball, field hockey and tennis and served as President of the Girls' Athletic Association. She was a member of the U.S. Marine Corps during WWII. She was manager of the National Junior team for three years and was appointed manager of the national team in January, 1977.

DR. ARIE SELINGER, head coach. Was born in Poland, educated in Israel and obtained his doctor of philosophy degree at the University of Illinois-Urbana. For 11 years, he was a member of the national volleyball team (men's) of Israel. After coaching the '76 USVBA

women's championship team, he signed on as national team coach for women. The USA national team finished fifth in the '78 world championships and qualified for the Olympic Games by finishing second to Cuba in the NORCECA (North America, Central America, Caribbean) qualification tournament in 1979. The national team also placed fourth in the '79 Pan Am Games.

TOSHIKI YOSHIDA, assistant coach. Is a native of Yamagata, Japan who earned his graduate master's degree at Tsubata University in Japan, '78, before coming to the U.S. to handle the USA National Junior Team in March '79. For one year, he had been assistant coach of the women's team at Tsubata University and for two years was assistant coach of the famed Hitachi Volleyball team.

WATER POLO

TERRY SAYRING, manager. Serves as a pharmaceutical company sales manager. Born in Terre Haute, he now resides in Manhattan Beach. He has been national team manager since 1977.

MONTE NITZKOWSKI, coach. Has "graduated" from breaststroke specialist on the '52 Olympic team to the last 13 years of water polo coaching at the highest levels, starting with an assignment as assistant coach of the '67 Pan Am gold medalist team and the '68 Olympic team. Since 1976, he has been the national team coach as the USA has re-grouped its water polo resources and placed fifth in the '78 world championships to qualify for the Olympic Games. He graduated from UCLA and earned a master's degree from Cal. State at Long Beach. He coaches water polo and teaches physical education at Long Beach City College. He handled the '79 Pan Am team that won the gold medal.

KENNETH EDWARD LINDGREN, assistant coach. Captained the water polo teams in high school, college (Cal. State at Long Beach) and for his AAU club team. Three times he played on the National AAU championship team. He has been a professor of mathematics

at Cerritos College for the last 18 years while coaching water polo at Cal. State at Long Beach. He has been the assistant national coach for four years. His Cal. State at L.B. teams have placed third, fourth (twice) and fifth in NCAA water polo competition and coached the AAU championship team in '74.

WEIGHTLIFTING

RICHARD CARL SMITH, manager. Has been a coach/trainer at the York Barbell Club since 1961. He was a part of the WWII army boxing program as a coach/second. He has been identified as the National Coaching Coordinator for the AAU Olympic weightlifting program.

JAMES WILLIAM SCHMITZ, coach. Won numerous football honors as an undergraduate at San Francisco State where he was captain, All Farwestern Conference defensive tackle and his college's most valuable defensive player. For the last dozen years, Schmitz has operated the Sports Palace in San Francisco, a weightlifting health club and gymnasium. Among his proteges were U.S. champions and Olympic team members such as Dan Cantore, Ken Patera, and mighty Bruce Wilhelm. Patera is now better known as a villain among the "rasslers". He served as coach of the '77 national team to the world championships, the '79 Pan American Team coach and the '79 manager of the national team for the world championships.

WRESTLING

STAN DZIEDZIC, manager, free-style. Was '77 world champion, '76 bronze medalist, '75 and '77 World Cup champion. Representing Slippery Rock (Penn) State, he was a 3-time NCAA Division II champion and in '71 also NCAA Division I titlist. His overall college record was an impressive 118-2. Since August, 1978, he has been the National AAU coach, headquartered in Lincoln, Nebraska.

MAJOR R. WAYNE BAUGHMAN, USA, manager/co-coach Greco-Roman. Has had a distinguished career in

wrestling: three-time Olympian in Greco-Roman, ('64, '68, '72); '67 Pan American champion in spite of a nasty rib cage injury; seven-time member of the USA national team for the world championships; four-time world military games (CISM) free-style and Greco-Roman champion; eight-time interservice free-style and seven-time interservice Greco-Roman champion; eight-time national AAU free-style champion; twenty-time National AAU All America selection; 1971 USWF free-style and Greco-Roman champion; and, finally, '76 National AAU Sambo champion. He was graduated from the University of Oklahoma in 1963 and has been identified ever since with Air Force wrestling activity, serving currently as the head coach at the US Air Force Academy. He is a member of the USOC Executive Board and the USOC Athletes' Advisory Council. He was coach of the successful USA free-style team at Montreal in '76 (one gold, three silver and two bronze) and was manager of the '79 Pan American team.

DANNY MACK GABLE, free-style coach. Was 64-0 in high school and 118-1 at Iowa State and, as far as is known, never lost in "open" competition. He was a three-time State of Iowa high school champion, a two-time NCAA champion, '71 USWF champion, two-time national AAU champion, '71 world champion and Pan American champion and '72 Olympic champion. He has been USA coach for the last three world championship teams which have produced 12 medals (best ever for USA). For the last four years, he has been head coach of wrestling at the University of Iowa (hated rivals of his alma mater, Iowa State). He has already won two NCAA team titles for Iowa University. In '80, the USA won World Cup free-style honors for the first time by decimating the defending champions from the USSR - our country's greatest team triumph in wrestling, bar none. Mr. and Mrs. Gable are the parents of two daughters.

YACHTING

SAMUEL V. MERRICK, Manager, has been active in sailing circles for many years. The USYRU has selected him to serve as manager because of his intimate knowledge of all phases of the sport. Now reitred, he makes Washington, D.C. his home.

CHARLES KOBER, Assistant Manager, Long Beach, has been sailing actively since 1937. He was North American Dragon champion '64. He has been assistant manager of the last three Olympic Teams and '79 Pan Am Manager. He is president of an international architectural firm in the Los Angeles area.

CARL EICHENLAUB, Shipwright. He has won many national and international events in his 30 years in the sport of sailing. He was also shipwright for the '76 Olympic Team and '79 Pan Am Team

HOMER S. ARNOLD, M.D. is the physician attached to the team for the third time. He resides in Austin, Tex.

ROBERT L. MAIRS, Meteorologist, from Edgewater, Md., has again been assigned this important task.

THE UNITED STATES OLYMPIC COMMITTEE

The United States Olympic Committee is an organization of organizations, comprising 45 major national sports organizations including 33 which are classified as national sports governing bodies for those sports on the Olympic and Pan American Games programs. Each of the 33 national sports governing bodies are recognized by, and hold membership in, international sports federations.

In addition the USOC has direct representation from the athletic community, each of the sports electing its own representative to the Athletes' Advisory Council from those athletes who have represented the United States of America within the last ten years in major international competitions, including the Olympic and Pan American Games.

Each of the states and the District of Columbia have direct representation on the United States Olympic Committee by state chairpersons who are appointed by the President of the United States Olympic Committee.

The United States Olympic Committee is recognized by the International Olympic Committee as the sole agency in the United States of America concerned with identifying, training, selecting, entering, and underwriting the full expenses for the United States teams in both the Olympic Games and the Pan American Games. The current national Olympic committee dates back to the small group concerned with entering the United States athletes in the inaugural Olympic Games in Athens, 1896.

However, in November, 1921, the forerunner of the current organization held a constitutional convention in the New York Athletic Club. It was at this meeting that the body assumed a formal organization.

In 1950 the Congress of the United States enacted, and the President of the United States signed into law, Public Law 805 granting a federal charter to the national Olympic committee. This charter as a private non-profit corporation added stature to the United States Olympic Committee. Also, under the terms of the Public Law the USOC was permitted to solicit contributions for its work, which contributions were declared tax deductible.

As recently as November 8, 1978, President Jimmy Carter signed Public Law 95-606, The Amateur Sports Act of 1978 culminating several years of outside study and debate on the floor of Congress. The Public Law, an amended version of PL 805, specifically identifies the United States Olympic Committee as the coordinating agency for all international competitions in those sports on the programs for the Olympic Games and Pan American Games.

This Public Law may be considered the single most important federal legislation ever enacted on behalf of amateur athletes and amateur sports in the United States. The law recognized the portion of the USOC Constitution detailing the rights of athletes above and beyond due process at the lowest level. In addition, the Public Law delineated procedures for the settlement of all disputes between national sports organizations, as well as problems arising between amateur athletes and national sports organizations when the question at hand concerns competitions.

OPERATIONS OF THE UNITED STATES OLYMPIC COMMITTEE

In the last eight years the operations of the USOC have been greatly expanded. The USOC is concerned with much more than merely selecting, organizing, and funding the direct expenses of our teams for the Olympic Games, the Olympic Winter Games and the Pan American Games.

However, all of the USOC programs are dedicated to assure strong representation of the United States in these important Games. Expenditures to carry out its responsibilities to the nation's national sports governing bodies and the amateur athletes of our country have risen greatly and dramatically in the last 15 years. For the 1968 Olympic Games in Mexico City the total budget for the four-year operation was about three million dollars. At the end of the present quadrennium, 1977-1980, we shall have expended more than 43 million dollars.

In the last four years the USOC has made its greatest expansion moves. In an effort to assure more qualified world class athletes, along with more expansive programs at the "grass roots" level, the Executive Board of the USOC and its House of Delegates have approved:

(1) Inauguration of the Training Center Concept. Currently the USOC is operating National Training Centers at Colorado Springs and Squaw Valley, California, capable of accommodating up to 500 athletes, each. Both training centers are designed to handle athletes from many of the sports on the programs for the Olympic Games and the Olympic Winter Games.

Athletes to participate in the national training center programs are selected by the national sports governing bodies (33 in number). The national organizations undertake the travel expenses. However, expenses for athletes, coaches, and administrators at the national training centers are underwritten in full by the USOC.

(Because of the high cost of operation it is contemplated that the training center at Squaw Valley will be discontinued before the end of the current year.)

Since these training centers were opened during the summer of 1977, more than 33,000 athletes from some 30 sports have had an opportunity to participate in programs.

A minimum of dollars have been spent on capital improvements. The Squaw Valley center was located on the site of the former Olympic Village for the 1960 Olympic Winter Games. The Colorado Springs site was the former Ent Air Force Base. However, at Colorado Springs the USOC did undertake the construction of a synthetic 400-meter running track, meeting the demanding regulations propounded by the International Amateur Athletic Federation, world governing body for track and field whose USA affiliate is the Track and Field Congress of the USA.

The United States Olympic Committee has received excellent cooperation from those with athletic facilities in the vicinity of both training centers. However, the USOC continues to seek funds to accomplish a number of much needed improvements. The national sponsor for the national training centers under contract to the USOC is the Burger King Corporation.

(2) Implementation of a sophisticated Sports Medicine Program designed to maximize the skills and techniques of the nation's athletes. At Colorado Springs, the USOC has established a Research Center for the processing and storing of medical data which should be useful in medical studies and athletic comparisons in the coming years. At this Research Center Data General of Massachusetts has contributed equipment to step up the effectiveness of the biomechanical analysis of athletes' techniques.

As part of the Sports Medicine Program the USOC has a Mobile Sports Van "on the road" almost continuously. This van brings to the athletes in training at various locations the latest in cardio-vascular testing equipment. The program is more than novel. It answers a "crying need" of some years.

(3) National Sports Festival. After successful Festivals at Colorado Springs in 1978 and 1979 which attracted more than 5,000 athletes selected by the 33 national sports governing bodies, the happening is considered a premier sports attraction nationally.

The level of competition at the Festival has varied. For example, the Amateur Hockey Association of the United States used the 1979 Festival to select its Olympic team. The team is the same group of 20 players who went on to win the 1980 Olympic Games ice hockey tournament.

Other sports have identified the competition at the Festival as the qualification meet for the selection of national teams leading up to world championships. Still other national sports governing bodies prefer to use the Festival as a first opportunity for younger athletes to live in, and be a part of, a competition conducted under Olympic-like conditions.

The complete expenses of the National Sports Festival are underwritten by the United States Olympic Committee. The USOC seeks out a national sponsor for the competition when the Festival moves to Syracuse in 1981. The Organizing Committee in Syracuse already in being. Other locations are under active consideration for the Festivals of 1982 and 1983.

Under the program adopted by the USOC, Festivals are not conducted in the years of the Olympic Games.

(4) The Colorado Springs Complex. In addition to the training center which operates as a separate entity, Colorado Springs also serves as the national headquarters of the USOC (having moved there from New York City on July 1, 1978) as well as the permanent home for ten national sports governing bodies. The USOC provides rent-free accommodations and a number of ancillary services for the national sports governing bodies selecting Colorado Springs as headquarters locations.

(5) The USOC underwrites all expenses for the conduct of Olympic final selection trials. Under plans submitted by the individual sports governing bodies and approved by the USOC Executive Board, the actual selection competitions and meets are under the direction of the respective national sports governing bodies. It is a policy of the USOC to handle all personal expenses of athletes from the time they are selected for the Olympic Team until they return home.

Thus, in the year 1980 when there will be no Olympic competition for the United States athletes, the USOC will underwrite expenses for international competitions for those who have been selected members of the Olympic Team, as well as the expenses for Olympic Honors Day in Washington D.C., July 30 at which time the President of the United States will join in with others to salute the members of the 1980 United States Olympic Team.

(6) USOC Development Program. It was almost 20 years ago that the then USOC Board of Directors approved a modest sum of \$250,000 to be spent on projects related directly to the development of potential Olympic athletes. The program was hailed at the time of its adoption.

For the current quadrennium ending December 31, 1980, the USOC will have appropriated and expended about \$9.2 million on perhaps as many as 1,400 separate development projects submitted by the national sports governing bodies, reviewed by the USOC Development Committee, and approved by the USOC Executive Board.

Through allocations by the USOC Development Committee we can point with pride to the improved world rankings of the women's volleyball team, the

women's basketball team, the women's field hockey team, the men's water polo team as well as the ascendancy of the USA free-style wrestlers to the very top in their sport.

Never have so few dollars, expended wisely for so many potential Olympic-class athletes, achieved such unrivaled success in the history of amateur sports in our country.

It has been predicted, however, that the success of the USA athletes in the international sports theatre will be much more noticeable during the quadrennial period 1981-1984 because of the escalated Development Program and the effects of the activities at the national training centers.

As a result of the program made available to the amateur athlete it is felt that the final results will be limited only by the dedication of the athletes taking advantage of these opportunities offered under the aegis of the United States Olympic Committee.

THE GOVERNANCE COUNCILS

The United States Olympic Committee is directed by a three-tiered governance structure.

The governance councils include: (1) House of Delegates which meets annually; (2) Administrative Committee which meets at least six times a year; and (3) Executive Board which meets at least three times a year.

HOUSE OF DELEGATES. This body consists of representatives from 46 national sports organizations, the 50 states and the District of Columbia, plus all current officers of the USOC (6), past officers of the USOC, representatives of the International Olympic Committee to the United States, and the USA representative on the Executive Board of the Pan American Sports Organization (governing council for the Pan American Games).

This group meets annually to set down the general policy as well as consider amendments to the Constitution and By-Laws. In the year following the Games, the House of Delegates is convened to select a new set of officers for the USOC. Only the President of the USOC is ineligible for re-election.

Representatives to the House of Delegates are selected by the national sports organizations themselves. The states are represented by the State chairmen who have been named by the USOC President acting upon nominations from the chairman of the Finance Committee who is charged with the responsibility of raising funds from the general public.

In line with setting the general policy, the House of Delegates convened at Colorado Springs, April 12, 1980, and by a vote of 1704 to 697 declared the United States would not participate in the Games of the XXII Olympiad. It is significant to note that one-fifth of the representation from each of the national sports organizations must be recent athletes who have represented the USA internationally within the last ten years.

ADMINISTRATIVE COMMITTEE. Under the USOC President, this committee consists of the six current officers and seven members selected by the President from names submitted by the national sports governing bodies, the national multi-sport organizations, and the Athletes' Advisory Council. In addition there are seven non-voting members of the Committee, including the Executive Director.

The Administrative Committee has the responsibility for supervising the conduct of the daily affairs of the USOC, according to policy guidelines prescribed by the Executive Board.

EXECUTIVE BOARD. This Board, currently numbering 82, has general charge of the business affairs and activities of the USOC. It also defines the policies to be followed in carrying out the purposes and objects of the USOC as outlined in Public Law 95-606.

Like all USOC officers, members of the House of Delegates and the members of the Administrative Committee, these men and women serve without salary. The Executive Board represents the creme de la creme of amateur sports organizations in the United States.

In brief, the Executive Board consists of the following groups:

- (a) The six current officers and Immediate Past President of the USOC;
- (b) IOC members to the United States and the representative of the USA to the Executive Board of the Pan American Sports Organization;
- (c) Representatives named and elected by the 33 national sports governing bodies;
- (d) Representatives named and elected by the 12 national multi-sport organizations (including five from the school/college community, three from religious-oriented groups, the Armed Forces, Boy Scouts of America, a service organization for amateur athletics, and a group of professional educators, college, secondary and elementary schools.)
- (e) Representatives of the athletes. For additional details see "Athletes Advisory Council;"
- (f) One representative elected by the group of State Chairpersons;
- (g) Six persons, not affiliated with or associated with any amateur sports organization, representing the interest of the general public.

The Constitution prescribes that each member of the Executive Board shall take office at the Quadrennial Meeting of the House of Delegates, held the year following the Olympic Games.

CONSTITUTIONAL AND STANDING COMMITTEES

Much of the effective work of the United States Olympic Committee is carried on by Constitutional and Standing Committees appointed by the USOC President with the approval of the Executive Board.

Among the Constitutional Committees are those for Budget and Audit, Development, Finance (in charge of fund raising among the general public), Investment, Games Preparation, Education Council, and the Sports Medicine Council.

The regular standing committees are Apparel, Supplies and Equipment, Eligibility, Food and Housing, Games Site Selection and National Training Centers, International Relations, Handicapped in Sports (representatives of the major national organizations concerned with providing competitive opportunities for the handicapped), Legislation, Membership, Public Relations, Team Services, Transportation, and Ticket Services.

ATHLETES' ADVISORY COUNCIL

Inaugurated in 1973, this Council was created to bring the recent amateur athletes into the work of the United States Olympic Committee. It has achieved many goals in the last 12 years.

Members of the Council are elected by the athletes in each of the sports on the programs for the Olympic and Pan American Games. This presents the athletes with a strong "sounding board" for the various governance councils of the USOC and its meetings usually precede those of the House of Delegates and the Executive Board.

This Council elects members directly to the Executive Board. Under the Constitution at least 20 per cent of the USOC Executive Board must be composed of these recent athletes. During the current quadrennium there are 14 men and women selected by the Athletes' Advisory Council to sit on the Executive Board.

THE UNITED STATES OLYMPIC SOCIETY

The United States Olympic Society was organized in 1975 to provide an opportunity for all America to identify directly with the Olympic movement in the United States. Membership is achieved by annual dues.

One of the perquisites of membership is receipt of the official magazine, The Olympian, published ten times a year. Editor of the magazine is R. Michael Moran with headquarters at Colorado Springs.

(Note: All members of the official delegations to the 1979 Pan American Games, the 1980 Olympic Winter Games, and the members selected for the 1980 Olympic Team receive complimentary copies of The Olympian.)

IN RECAPITULATION

The United States Olympic Committee over the years has evolved into a working and workman-like organization designed to effect and reflect the needs of the amateur athletes and amateur sports organizations. The Committee can look ahead with great pride that all segments of the amateur sports community are well represented at all levels of the organization.

However, the work of the Committee is directed at its most important constituency, the active athletes. The Committee has dedicated itself to excellence in reflecting these needs.

Up to the present time the United States Olympic Committee has been supported magnificently by the generosity of the American public, including a number of major corporations who are identified by the goods and services they provide for the support of the Olympic Team.

Currently under consideration by the Congress of the United States are several proposals to help support the work of the USOC in the coming years.

U.S.O.C. MEMBER ORGANIZATIONS

GROUP "A" National Sports Governing Bodies

Eligible for Group A shall be those national organizations which are recognized by the USOC as the national sports governing bodies for the sports on the program of the Olympic or Pan American Games. Each member of Group A shall be identified with a sport eligible for inclusion in such Games. In accordance with IOC Rule 24, the USOC shall not recognize more than one national amateur sports governing body in each sport. Each national governing body is recognized by the USOC as entertaining jurisdiction over all international amateur competition involving the United States teams or individuals, in conformity with rules and regulations of its international federation.

The National Sports Governing Bodies for each of the sports on the programs for the Olympic and Pan American Games are, by sport:

- AQUATICS (Swimming, Diving, Water Polo, and Synchronized Swimming)- The Aquatics Division of the AAU (This organization has applied to the international amateur swimming federation for a change in name.)

- BOXING - Boxing Division of the AAU (This organization will apply for a change in name.)

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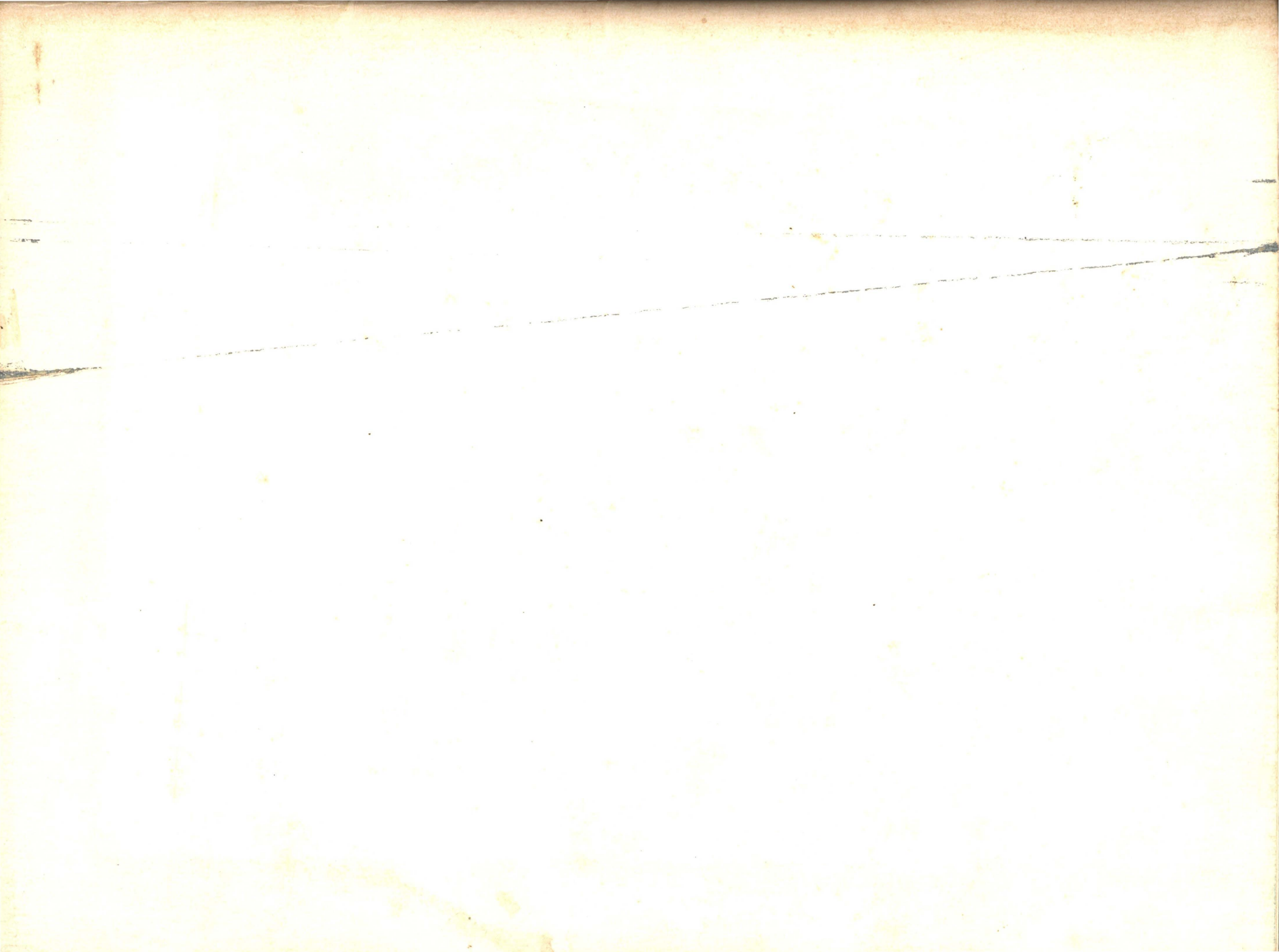

COLORADO SPRINGS---The United States Olympic Team (except for the swimmers to be selected Aug. 2) consists of 430 athletes from 42 states, according to F. Don Miller, executive director.

It is expected that another 51 athletes will be selected off the national long course swimming championships at Irvine, Cal., July 29 - Aug. 1.

The 1980 Olympic Team will be assembled in Washington, D.C. July 26 for the Olympic Honors Day program, culminating with presentation of a special medal authorized by the Congress of the United States. Presentation will be made on the West Steps of the Capitol at 12:30 on July 30.

There are 75 athletes on the '80 Olympic Team who also were members of the 1976 team in the Games of the XXI Olympiad in Montreal.

California already has placed 101 athletes on the Olympic Team along with seven coaches, six managers and a boatwright. It would be expected that California would place as many as 20 swimmers on the team, also.

Pennsylvania with 29 athletes was second in the number of athletes on the team, followed by Massachusetts and New York with 27 each, Texas 25 and Illinois 22.

Seven states and the District of Columbia were identified with but a single athlete each. The states were Delaware, Maine, Montana, Nevada, New Mexico, Rhode Island, South Carolina and South Dakota.

The states with no athletes on the USA team were Alaska, Hawaii, Idaho, Mississippi, New Hampshire, North Dakota, West Virginia and Wyoming.

Among the '76 team members are four gold medalists from track and field and Darrell Pace, Cincinnati, winner of the archery event.

The track and field gold medalists are discus thrower Mac Wilkins, Soquel, Cal.; Herman Frazier, Tempe, Ariz., 4 x 400 meters relay; and Harvey Glance, Auburn, Ala., 4 x 100 meters relay.

Lt. Col. Lones Wigger, USA, won his first Olympic title in the small bore rifle, 3-position, event in 1964 at Tokyo. At Munich, 1972, Col. Wigger was the free rifle champion. He's back again .

Randy Williams was only 18 when he won the Olympic long jump diadem in '72 and then four years ago he was the silver medalist in his specialty. At the Olympic Trials in Eugene, Williams, a Los Angeles resident, qualified for a third trip to the Olympic Games.

Ben Peterson, Watertown, Wis., won a '72 gold medal in wrestling and was a silver medalist at Montreal. The Iowa State graduate earned a place on his third team.

Madeline Manning, Tulsa, Okla., won the women's 800 meters at Mexico City 12 years ago. She was disappointed with her Olympic Games' performances in 1972 and 1976 but came back stronger than ever in the Olympic Trials recently at Eugene, Ore., to land herself a place on the team for a fourth time at the age of 32.

J. Michael Plumb, Chesapeake City, Md., won his place on the three-day event equestrian squad for the sixth straight time. He was a member of the gold medalist three-day event "team" champions at Montreal and rode Better and Better to a silver medal in the individual portion of the three-day event.

There's no question that Bob Nieman, San Antonio, is the most versatile of all the athletes earning places on the Olympic team. The reigning world champion in the modern pentathlon sport, Nieman also earned a place on the USA Olympic fencing

team. The first USA Olympic athlete to earn a place on both the modern pentathlon and fencing squads was the late Gen. George Patton. As a freshly-commissioned second lieutenant in 1912 he competed at Stockholm but failed to win any medals.

Another four-time Olympian on the women's track and field squad is Maren Seidler, San Jose, Cal., 12-time national outdoor shotput champion.

Bruce Kennedy, formerly a citizen of Rhodesia who was naturalized several years ago, may be the most frustrated Olympic Team member. Twice Kennedy qualified for the Rhodesian Olympic team but was prevented from competing when Rhodesia was barred by the International Committee from competing. This time he earned a place on the USA team. He will not attend the ceremonies in Washington since he is on holiday in Rhodesia.

Among the 15 members of previous USA Olympic Teams serving as coaches and members of the current Olympic team, the only Olympic gold medalist is free-style wrestling mentor Dan Gable, Iowa City, winner at Munich eight years ago.

Other Olympians serving in administrative positions are Major Wayne Baughman, USAF, Colorado Springs, manager of Greco-Roman wrestling; Major Ernie Cunliffe, USAF, assistant manager of the track team; Maj. Gen. Jonathan Burton, USA (ret.), manager of the equestrian team; Dick Dreissigacker, Morrisville, Vt., boatman for the rowing squad; Stan Dziedzic, Lincoln, Neb., manager of free-style wrestling; Pat Head, Knoxville, Tenn., assistant coach of women's basketball; Jack Keane, East Brunswick, N.J., fencing team captain; Carl Leusenkamp, Aloha, Ore., assistant cycling coach; Major Paul Maruyama, USAF, Colorado Springs, judo coach; Harry Parker, Cambridge, MASS., rowing coach; Sperry Rademaker, Floral City, Fla., kayak coach; Andras Toro, El Cerrito, Cal., canoe coach; Mike Vespoli, New Haven, Conn., rowing coach.

Members of the Olympic Team will be quartered in Arlington, VA., at the Marriott Twin Bridges Hotel during their five-day stay in the nation's Capitol.
